Travel with James Oles

JAMES (JAY) OLES, Senior Lecturer in the Art Department at Wellesley College and adjunct curator of Latin American art at the Davis Museum, is a specialist in Latin American art, focusing on modern Mexican art and architecture, through museum as well as academic projects. In February 2019, he opened Art_Latin_America: Against the Survey, which features 150 works by 100 Latin American and Latinx artists in the collection of the Davis Museum.

His books include South of the Border: Mexico in the American Imagination, 1914-1947 (Smithsonian Institution Press, 1993) and Art and Architecture in Mexico (Thames & Hudson, 2013), the first survey of its kind in some fifty years. He has also published scholarly essays in journals and museum catalogues on a wide variety of topics with a focus on Mexican art of the 1920s, 1930s, and 1940s.

Oles divides his time between the US and Mexico, where he has organized numerous exhibitions, including at the Museo de Arte Moderno and Museo del Palacio de Bellas Artes. His current projects include the traveling exhibition *Mexichrome*, the first major history of color photography in Mexico, and a major exhibition on Diego Rivera's work of the 1920s and 1930s, which opens at the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art in October 2020.

Wednesday, October 30, 2019

Arrivals in Puebla

Depart the United States on independent flights to Mexico City International Airport (MEX) arriving by the early afternoon. Board a private motorcoach for a two-hour group transfer to the Rosewood Hotel in Puebla and check in. Our first destination is the Museo Amparo, with pre-Columbian and colonial art collections, and a dynamic contemporary art program. Enjoy cocktails and dinner with the director on the rooftop patio overlooking the city.

Thursday, October 31, 2019

The Historic Center of Puebla

Spend the morning on a walking tour of some of the most important colonial monuments in Puebla's historic center. We will see the Casa del Deán, a former mansion that houses elaborate 16th-century murals inspired by Ovid; the Puebla Cathedral, a 17th-century masterpiece in a severe style inspired by the Escorial outside of Madrid; and the Capilla del Rosario, a 17th-century chapel in the Dominican church with one of the world's most spectacular baroque interiors. Enjoy mole and other local specialties at a restaurant few tourists ever visit. This afternoon, take a tour of the Museo Internacional del Barroco, a phenomenal museum of baroque art designed by Japanese architect Toyo Ito. Return to the hotel to rest before gathering for a delicious dinner at one of Puebla's best restaurants, with time to wander the streets, which for the next two nights will be energized by Day of the Dead festivities.

Friday, November 1, 2019

Day of the Dead in Huaquechula

Continue exploring Puebla with a visit to a traditional urban market to see sugar candies, tissue paper banners, and other iconic Day of the Dead crafts. In the late morning, depart for the rural town of Huaquechula, which has a grand mission church and is famous for its Day of the Dead celebrations. We will be invited into private homes to see elaborate altars commemorating loved ones who died in the previous year. Gather for lunch at the open-air stalls of the Huaquechula market, which are set up for the holiday in the center of the town and offer amazing traditional cuisine. There will be regional dances including the famous *voladores*, who climb a tall wooden pole and then leap off like birds. Return to Puebla and enjoy an evening at leisure.

Saturday, November 2, 2019

Huejotzingo, Calpan, Cholula & Tonantzintla

Today is dedicated to visiting towns surrounding Puebla to see important colonial architecture and to witness Day of the Dead celebrations. Check out of the hotel and depart Puebla in the morning for the towns of Calpan and Huejotzingo, housing two of the best surviving missionary churches built during the mid-16th century. The small chapels at Calpan include carvings made by indigenous artists inspired by European woodcuts. In Calpan, we will discretely watch the town gathering for mass and decorating tombs in the local cemetery. Next, we visit Cholula, an ancient city with an enormous surviving pyramid and a host of churches, where we will enjoy a lovely lunch in a garden setting before continuing on to the tiny towns of Tonantzintla and Acatepec, with churches inspired by high style baroque monuments but rendered by local folk artists. Arrive in Mexico City in the early evening to check into the Four Seasons Hotel and gather for a welcome dinner in Zanaya, the hotel restaurant.

Sunday, November 3, 2019

Murals of Mexico City

Spend the morning learning about the modern mural movement launched by Diego Rivera and José Clemente Orozco in the 1920s. We start at the Antiguo Colegio de San Ildefonso, continue to the Ministry of Public Education, and end at the National Palace. Along the way we will see the exposed ruins of the Templo Mayor, the main building of the Aztec capital; the vast Zócalo, Mexico City's main square flanked by the city's impressive cathedral and governmental palace; and other sites, many off the beaten track. Next, enjoy a lunch of traditional Mexican specialties at El Cardenal, one of the best restaurants in Mexico City. Following lunch, walk past colonial palaces and the neo-Venetian Post Office to the Palace of Fine Arts for a tour of murals by Rivera, Orozco, and Siqueiros. Take refuge from the bustling Mexico City streets and enjoy a relaxed cocktail reception in a contemporary space before returning to the hotel. This evening, gather for dinner at a hip restaurant in the Colonia Roma.

Monday, November 4, 2019

Anthropology Museum, Luis Barragán & Contemporary Galleries of Mexico City

Begin the morning by walking through Chapultepec Park to the incomparable National Museum of Anthropology, where we will take a private tour of major highlights, with a focus on the Aztec collections. This is the largest and most visited museum in Mexico, but by special arrangement we will get to see the galleries when they're closed to the public. Continue to Casa Luis Barragán, designed by Mexico's most famous architect, and now a house museum. One of the most influential and representative examples of modern Mexican architecture, the home was designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Across the street we'll visit LABOR, one of the city's most important contemporary galleries, and then continue to special visits to the kurimanzutto gallery and the







Galería de Arte Mexicano. We'll have a private lunch at one of the galleries and end with cocktails at the Proyecto Paralelo gallery. We will meet the gallery owners and artists at each stop. Return to the hotel in the early evening. Gather for a dinner in the home of a private art collector.

Tuesday, November 5, 2019

Modern Architecture & Kahlo Museums

Today is dedicated to the south of Mexico City. We begin our day at the National Autonomous University of Mexico (UNAM) for a tour of the exterior murals installed on the modernist campus in the early 1950s, one of the greatest architectural landmarks in the Americas. Depending on current exhibitions, we will have a private tour of the University Museum of Contemporary Art. Next. drive to the Diego Rivera and Frida Kahlo Studio Museum, built by Juan O'Gorman for the newly married couple in 1931. Across the street, enjoy a lovely lunch at the San Angel Inn, which also boasts the city's best margaritas. Following lunch, tour the Anahuacalli Museum, a neo-Aztec pyramid made of volcanic stone, which was designed by Diego Rivera and houses his collection of pre-Columbian art. End at Frida Kahlo's Blue House Museum for an exclusive after-hours tour. The Blue House was Kahlo's family home and is a shrine to her memory that also provides crucial insights into her life and career. In 1958, Rivera donated the house and its contents to the state, establishing the site as a museum in Kahlo's honor. Return to the hotel before gathering for dinner in Mexico City's Polanco district.

Wednesday, November 6, 2019

Teotihuacán & the Jumex Museum

Gather this morning for an early departure for Teotihuacán, a vast archaeological complex northeast of Mexico City. We will learn the history of this remarkable city, now a UNESCO World Heritage Site, which had a population of over 100,000 during its heyday in the 7th century. After seeing the pyramids and luxurious housing compounds still packed with ancient murals, we will enjoy a picnic lunch in the garden in front of the nearby Acolman Monastery before returning to the Four Seasons. Later in the afternoon, gather for a visit to the Tamayo Museum, a public contemporary art museum located in Chapultepec Park, which produces innovative international art exhibitions and houses the international collection of modern art formed by artist Rufino Tamayo. We end the day at the Museo Jumex, founded by Eugenio López, one of the world's leading contemporary art collectors, and designed by British architect David Chipperfield. We'll take a quick peek at the controversial Museo Soumaya. Tonight, gather for an unforgettable farewell dinner at the phenomenal home of Mexico's leading antiques dealer and art collector.

Registrations will be accepted beyond this date on a space-available basis with payment in full by check only.

FLIGHTS: Airfare is not included in the tour price. Participants are responsible for all aspects of their round-trip air arrangements.

between July 23, 2019 and September 16, 2019: full refund of any recoverable land costs, less \$2,950 per person cancellation charge (includes administrative fee). Written cancellations received on or after September 17, 2019: no refund. After the tour has commenced, it is not possible to issue any refunds. No refunds for any unused portion of the tour including, but not limited to, occasional missed meals or any missed sightseeing tours. Costs for promotion, staff, and other group expenses are not refundable. In the case of cancellation, substitutions are not acceptable. The tour cost is non-transferable, and no substitutions are allowed.
